Skills For Life – our story so far....

Our plan to prepare better futures 2018-2023

The Group has worked hard this past twelve months to bring ourselves in line with the Skills For Life vision of The Scout Association, and with that the vision for Merseyside Scouts and Wallasey District.

Growth

Our Scouting succeeds when we are able to offer an exciting, adventurous and challenging programme for our young members - not just every week at our meetings, but through residential experiences and other activities away from our headquarters. We continue to receive requests to join, and in some sections have waiting lists, which isn't a good thing, as this means there are young people missing out on Scouting. The key to us growing, and being able to expand our programme and activities is our recruitment of more adult volunteers, who can join the team and support our Section Leaders In a whole manner of ways - be It making brews, baking with the children, helping with the allotment, running games, helping at camps, lighting fires, walking and hiking, getting crafty with glitter and glue... you name It, there's always help needed, and we would welcome growth In the number of adults volunteers we have In the Group! Want to know more... speak with any member of the team!

We should remain proud of our achievements, especially those of the Section Leaders delivering programmes that keep our Young Members returning week in week out, with many more also wanting to join our adventure. And, whilst our numbers dropped slightly this year, we can, and will, continue to grow as we work to deliver Skills For Life adventures for all of our members.

Inclusivity

Scouting nationally continues to become more reflective of the diversity within our society, and we can pride ourselves in being a group that is open to all, but we need to do more!

This year, around 30% of our current members have a disability or health condition, and we continue to work closely to support these members to ensure they are fully able to participate, offering flexibilities where necessary. Many of our Leaders have also undertaken specialist training to better understand certain conditions, such as ADHD, and Mental Health First Aid Training, all which helps ensure we can adapt to the needs of individuals.

More Girls - In 2014, 49% of our youth membership were female but in 2017 this was just 20% - and this year only a small increase to 22.2% - so questions going forward need to ask how can we increase the number of girls enjoying Skills For Life at the 12th?

Whilst we do have some representation from minority and ethnic backgrounds, we know that more needs to be done to ensure we are seen to be a Group who are **open to all**, and one who readily invites all of our members to learn about, respect and experience different cultures, beliefs and backgrounds.

Youth Shaped

Our Scouting works better when our young people shape their experiences and take part in the decision making, something we have always known, and have been really active with over the past year.

We have continued to have success with our activities around the #YouShape programme, with all sections engaging with young members to assist in designing a programme of activities, events and camps that meets with their dreams and aspirations. Whether this has been through Beaver or Cub huddles, to Scout Forums, each of our young members have made their voices heard, have been listened to, and have shaped their Scouting.

One big success to report on has been with our engaging in the 'Wear Their Necker' project, which puts young people into decision-making positions, and encourages adults to hear their views. One of our Young Leaders, Emily, chose to continue wearing the GSL's Necker, and received recognition by way of a County Commissioners Commendation and You Shape Champion Award, for her work in wanting to learn all about group management. Community Impact

Our community impact is something we still don't do anywhere near enough to specifically measure, and seek feedback on in respect of what we do, who for and who with.

Our immediate community is the family we call Scouts, and the impact we have on you all is measured in many ways by you returning week in and week out, but also by your participation in events like The Coastal Walk, Bag Packing in Morrisons, signing up to events that support our members attending the World Scout Jamboree, and so on. But it's more than that, our immediate community also expands to include Serpentine Road Family Church, the home of our Scouting adventures, with its members who are headed by Revd. Dr Steve Langford.

We participate in raising awareness of international issues, through activities like The Shelterbox Challenge; and in local issues through Parliament Week, but we don't record all of what we do because we just do it... we support our community locally, nationally and internationally.

We can and should do much more to record these activities, and celebrate our achievements.

A World of Scouting

Tic-Tac's Jamboree Journey

My jamboree journey began in October 2017 when I completed the application form to be a member of the UK International Service Team. This is the volunteer staff team that run the camp so the young members can have fun. I found out in January 2018 that I had been accepted to the next selection stage. For this I had to prepare an activity to demonstrate to 2 explorer scouts in 5 minutes. As one of the themes of the Summit Betchel Reserve (SBR) was sustainability, I decided to show



them how to make a water filter from natural material, i.e. make dirty water clean enough to drink. The selection weekend was in March 2018 at Waddacre camp site. I also had an interview and took part of team activity of digging a trench for a water pipe so moved a lot of soil in the pouring rain whilst we were being observed by the selection team. Finally, in April 2018 I found out the exciting news I had been selected for the IST team. Over 2000 adults had applied for 750 positions so was very honoured to be chosen.

Then the hard work began. I had to raise £3000 to get me there! So, with the help of my family, friends, 12th Wallasey members and work colleagues at Liverpool University who kindly donated to my cake sales, sweepstakes, raffles, bought badges and played bingo I was well on my way to raising the funds. I did attic sales and flea markets. I was also lucky to spend time joint fund raising with the 4 explorers from Wallasey who were attending the Jamboree too. With their parents we washed cars, ran a charity shop and had an amazing fashion show.

So then on 18th July I set off for jamboree. Two flights and a long bus journey later I arrived at the Ruby Welcome centre on 19th July, with hundreds of other IST. There were 10,000 IST staff along with 35,000 scouts from 152 countries attending, 4000 of them from UK. The SBR site has biggest zip wire network in the world, the 2nd biggest manmade climbing wall and 2nd biggest skatepark in the US. Some of the other activities available were a water assault course, white water rafting, archery and shooting. It was hot! We had lighting, rain, bear visits and were kept safe by the US army. My job was safety team on Foxtrot subcamp, making sure the unit sites were safe each day and following site safety rules.

The opening and closing ceremonies were amazing. It was like being at the Olympics with all the flags being presented. Bear Grylls dropped in literally and gave an inspiring speech. We had great music and a light show from drones. The finale firework and laser shows were amazing and lasted over 20 minutes. Watch all the shows and videos on You Tube to be inspired to apply to go to the next World Scout Jamboree in South Korea in 2023.

We had a great time in Washington for 2 days after jamboree with a proper bed and showers! I walked a lot, approx. 134 miles just at jamboree. I met some amazing people from around the world with amazing life stories. I have made some new friends who will be friends for life!

We will be inviting the explorers who attended the jamboree to come and give a presentation to the group soon. I also traded and collected lots of international badges, neckers and t-shirts and will bring them into show you soon.

Our Finances

Reporting on the financial year 2018/19

Financial Review

The Group accounts have been prepared in accordance with the Statement of Recommended Practice (Accounting and Reporting by Charities) applicable to charities preparing their accounts in accordance with the Financial Reporting Standard applicable and relevant to the recommendations of The Scout Association.

In accordance with the Charities Act 2011, the Group remains below the threshold in relation to its gross annual income, and therefore there has been no requirement to have the accounts independently examined or audited.

Review

The Group Accounts and accounting systems have continued to be in review, with further changes made to role of Group Treasurer within the reporting period.

With considerable support from, and enormous thanks to, Carla Sherlock, we have almost completed the full transition of the Group Accounting to Online Sage Accounting. Considerable work has been done with the accounts, and we also Identified that the use of Invoicing on the OSM system, whilst accurately recording Income and expenditure, is not the most expedient method of managing the group finances. Add to this, our bank account being too old to be upgraded to Include online banking, not all of the changes we had hoped to achieve have come about.

Moving Forwards

The Group Scout Leader, Andrew, continued to control the Group Accounts and Finances whilst a replacement treasurer was sourced. Katie Christopher has now agreed to become the Group Treasurer with effect 30/09/2019, and Andrew has worked with Carla to finalise the end of year accounts.

Additionally, Mike, Andrew, Debbie and Carla have worked with Katie to determine what further actions might be required to finalise the review.

Additionally, the review has highlighted the need for, and the Executive Committee have approved, our upgrading and consolidating two of the existing bank accounts held.

The upgrade to a new bank account will provide us with online banking, with much greater access to our account information in real time. As we progress through the 2019/20 financial year, we are confident that by year end we will:

- Have all accounts operating through Sage One
- Have all spending recorded on accounts spreadsheets
- Have a new bank account with online banking
- Be able to provide end of year invoices to all parents

Financial Highlights

Scouting at 12th Wallasey experienced some difficult economic times, no different to other Groups and similar organisations, mainly due to increased input costs, along with reduced investment returns, which have continued to presented a resistance to make increases in the charges being made. Just some of the increased costs which have continued to test us, include:

- Increase in 2019 Membership Fees rising from £57 to £60 per young member (and rising in real terms by 41% since 2015).
- 47% increase in certain Scouting costs, on items such as Badges, Certificates etc.
- 25% (average) increases in Camp Fees and on-site Adventurous Activities charges

These are just some examples, and we cannot escape the general economic increases to the cost of a great many resources that make up our Group expenditure; all of which go toward ensuring we can continue to deliver Scouting. However, our resistance to present real term costs, instead ensuring Group funds subsidise events and activities, has created a slow depletion in the funds available for these to continue to provide any meaningful level of support. Over the last year, we reduced the levels of subsidy, which we have seen has had an Impact, both on the number of adventures undertaken, and also the number of attendees at activities, events and camps. This action has however allowed us to replenish funds, which will enable us to consider returning to some level of subsidy for future events and activities. The Group Executive will continue to review this and support the section leaders in their financial planning and decision making.

We can celebrate some considerable efforts in respect of our fundraising this year though, and with enormous thanks to all of the adults and young members who took part in some of this year's fundraising activities, which have included:

- Wirral Charity Post (Scout Post)
- Wirral Coastal Walk
- 2 Bag Packs Morrisons

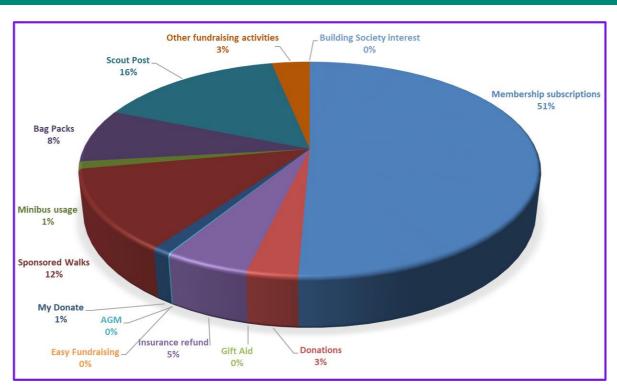
The Group's Trustees will continue applying careful stewardship to all operational aspects of the Group's finances, with a view to ensuring we maintain the lowest costs possible for our young members and their families. However, there may be a need to consider an Increase to membership fees from January 2020, to accommodate the levies in membership applied by HQ, County and at District levels, as well as our own expenditure requirements.

We must also continue to maximise the opportunities to raise funds by means other than increasing subscriptions and general charges, and will consult with all members of the Group Council where necessary.

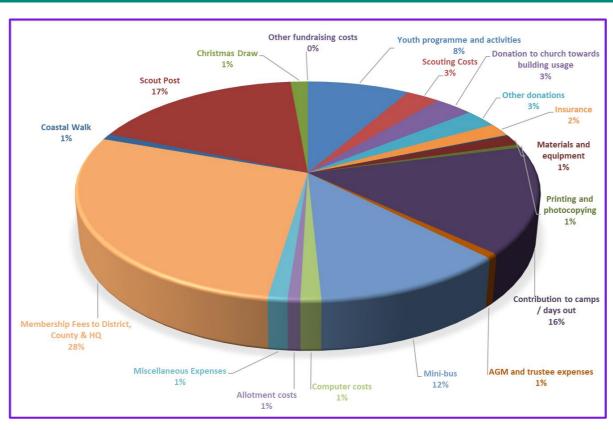
